A Theorist with Personal Experience of the Divide Between the Sexes

SAN FRANCISCO - Speaking to a standing room only crowd at the annual meeting of the Ecological Society of America in Snowbird, Utah, Dr. Joan Roughgarden, one of the world's most influential theoretical ecologists, is methodically taking apart the way that biologists think about sex.

Providing details that make some titter and shift nervously in their seats, she is re-thinking orgasms and the architecture of female genitals, making arguments for the existence of more than two genders and presenting evidence for widespread homosexual copulation in the wild.

Described as a visionary and iconoclast who consistently ignores disciplinary and conceptual boundaries, Dr. Roughgarden always draws a good crowd. But on this August day the room is packed, in part because this is not just more talk about science, but the outgrowth of a personal experience that two years ago riveted this entire community of scientists.

That was when Dr. Roughgarden crossed the most rigidly enforced boundary of all, the divide between the sexes. Born Jonathan Roughgarden, she became Joan in the spring of 1998 - a profound transformation that has led her not only onto new paths in science but into San Francisco politics as well.

Psychiatrists Cancel Gay Debate Associated Press

CHICAGO (AP) -- The American Psychiatric Association canceled a scheduled panel discussion of whether homosexuality can be altered through therapy, a move that has upset some self-described former gays.

The debate over what is known as reorientation therapy was pulled from the APA's convention agenda on Wednesday after two psychiatrists who contend that the subject is too politically charged for scientific discussion withdrew from the panel.

The cancellation led to a protest by Exodus International, a nondenominational Christian organization that seeks to help gays switch their sexual orientation.

"I'm here as one representative for a virtually unseen but sizable population," said Exodus' national board chairman, John Paulk of Colorado Springs. "I once lived as a gay man, but now I'm heterosexual, something the American Psychiatric Association says does not exist."

Paulk said he is a former drag queen who has two sons with his wife, Anne, a former lesbian.

The canceled debate was organized by Dr. Robert Spitzer, the same person who spearheaded the APA's decision in 1973 to remove homosexuality from the list of mental disorders. At the time, the Columbia University psychiatry professor argued that homosexuality does not meet the criteria necessary to be considered a mental disorder, calling it instead an "irregular" form of sexuality.

Now Spitzer wants to explore whether homosexuality can be reversed for some people. He contends that the only way to determine whether that is possible is to conduct scientific experiments and share information.

"There is no documentary evidence showing someone's sexual preference can be changed by therapy," Spitzer said. "There is only anecdotal evidence, mostly from the therapists themselves, claiming that what they do works. That's not very scientific."

"On the other hand, there's no scientific evidence to show that this is impossible," said Spitzer, who called the cancellation distressing. "It hasn't been studied."

Research Participants Sought for Sexual Orientation Study

University of Chicago researchers Khytam Dawood and Alan Sanders seek assistance in a research study entitled "Molecular Genetic Study of Sexual Orientation". The study seeks to recruit approximately 500 pairs of homosexual brothers and available parents in order to perform a linkage study to better understand the genetic contributions to this trait. A sample size of 500 brother pairs will allow the study to clear up some of the statistical uncertainty in this field of inquiry in previous work (~50 or fewer pairs of brothers each, and only examining the X chromosome, i.e., Dean Hamer's work and others). Death of the Good Doctor Lessons from the Heart of the AIDS Epidemic Kate Scannell, M.D.

Kate Scannell abandoned her academic career in 1985 to enter an ordinary medical practice in Northern California. Instead, the thirty-two-year-old physician found herself assigned to a county hospital AIDS ward where much of the medicine she has studied over many difficult years is rendered irrelevant.

Working with AIDS patients, nearly all of whom are dying, Scannell discovers the inadequacy of the "good" doctor who battles illness to keep patients alive regardless of their suffering. By embracing her patients' need for compassion and healing, Scannell reaches an expanded understanding of her patients and of herself as a physician.

THE DEATH OF THE GOOD DOCTOR richly chronicles the intimacy of Scannell's relationships with her patients through whom the vast complexities of the epidemic are uniquely b-cused. Scannell writes not only as a physician but as a lesbian who entered medical school having never seen a woman physician and who, at midlife, now faces ovarian cancer. It is through these beautiful, often difficult, and sometimes humorous portraits that the woman and the physician discover each other.


Women's Leadership Luncheon

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QUEER SCIENTISTS OF HISTORICAL NOTE

Allan Cox - 20th century American Geophysicist, specialist in paleomagnetism, and author of two well-know books on plate tectonics. Cox, originally a chemistry major as an undergraduate, discovered he had an instinctive eye for geology while performing summer field studies with his mentor and (future) lover Clyde Wahrhaftig. Cox and his colleagues developed a calendar showing the complicated and irregular schedule of polarity changes in the earth's past, and discovered evidence of plate tectonics. His work brought him many honors, include election to the National Academy of Sciences, and the American Geophysical Union's Fleming medal. Sonja Kovalevsky - 19th century Russian mathematician, developed Kovalevsky's theorem, editor of Acta Mathematica. Showing aptitude in mathematics at an early age, Kovalevsky is an example of a brilliant woman that encountered ridiculous barriers solely because of her gender. Women were not allowed to study in Russian universities, and her father considered it improper for

her to study abroad. Kovalevsky entered a marriage of convenience and went to Germany to study with Karl Weierstrass. For her 1888 work "on the Problem of the rotation of a solid Body about a Fixed Point", she was awarded the famous Prix Bordin of the French Academy of Sciences.
