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NOGLSTP Honors Nowick, Gingiss, and Uribe as Outstanding GLBT Scientist, Engineer, and Educator of the Year at Chicago Reception

NOGLSTP is pleased to announce the recipients of its 2009 Recognition Awards: James Nowick, GLBT Scientist of the Year; Anthony Gingiss, GLBT Engineer of the Year; and Virginia Uribe, GLBT Educator of the Year. These awardees will be honored at NOGLSTP's 2009 Recognition Awards Reception this month during the AAAS Annual Meeting in Chicago.

The NOGLSTP Recognition Awards program was established as a means of identifying, honoring, and documenting the contributions of outstanding GLBT science, engineering and technology professionals. We hope you will be inspired by the following short biographies for this year's awardees.

2009 NOGLSTP Scientist of the Year: James Nowick, Ph.D., Professor of Chemistry at UC Irvine. Dr. Nowick's research focuses on peptidomimetic chemistry, molecular recognition, and supramolecular chemistry, ie, understanding, emulating, and controlling the structure and interactions of proteins. Practical applications of this research include the development of agents to block the aggregation of peptides and proteins associated with Alzheimer's disease, and the development of molecular nanotechnology that may someday be able to alter and control the functioning of living cells. Dr. Nowick is also an activist for GLBT issues, teaching a course called *Queer Scientists, Queer Science*, mobilizing UCI faculty members in the fight against California's Proposition 8, mentoring GLBT STEM students, and networking with / advising GLBT colleagues throughout North America. Dr. Nowick received his Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry from MIT.

2009 NOGLSTP Engineer of the Year: Anthony J. Gingiss, M.S., Inter-Segment Systems Engineering Integration and Test Manager for the GPS IIF Program at Boeing Space and Intelligence Systems in El Segundo, CA. The global positioning system IIF (GPS IIF) is an upgrade of the original GPS, which is a worldwide timing and navigation system that utilizes 24 satellites positioned in orbit approximately 12,000 miles above the Earth's surface. Mr. Gingiss' responsibilities on this project include all systems engineering spanning both Space and Control Segments, Flight Products, and Mission Readiness and Mission Operations Support. Mr. Gingiss is President Emeritus of the El Segundo California chapter of the Boeing Employee Association of Gays, Lesbians, and Friends (BEAGLES). He has been active

2009 NOGLSTP Educator of the Year: Virginia Uribe, Ph.D., retired high school science teacher, counselor, and founder of **Project 10**. Project 10 — launched in 1984 by Dr. Uribe — is a support system for GLBTQ students that has been institutionalized in Los Angeles Unified School District, and serves as a model for similar programs in other school districts throughout the nation. Project 10 focuses on building school-based support for teens by training school personnel in conflict resolution and suicide prevention, helping students participate in the development of school protection policies and providing access to information about human sexuality. Recognizing that GLBTQ youth need positive adult role models and that post-secondary studies are essential for career and vocational opportunities, Dr. Uribe also started Models of Pride and Models of Excellence. Models of Pride is a full day conference for queer youth and their allies. Models of Excellence is a scholarship program that has awarded over \$100000 to LGBTQ Youth. Dr. Uribe's PhD is in Counseling Psychology.

Keasling and Bertozzi are UC Berkeley professors, each directing multiple laboratories and institutes. Bertozzi is also NOGLSTP's 2007 GLBT Scientist of the Year. Harris is a Genentech Medical Director, well as a UCSF faculty member. Benzein is currently Associate Director for Pharmacology at Exelixis.

NOGLSTP at Purdue was started in late summer by its President, Kay Johnson, who is a Graduate School Fellow in Aeronautics & Astronautics at Purdue University. Meeting weekly on campus, the mission of the group is to encourage and promote an environment for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Queer (LGBTQ) students, faculty, staff, and their partners at Purdue (especially in the Colleges of Engineering, Science, and Technology) that is supportive and inclusive and free from discrimination and bias.

The event is question was a Transgender Day of Remembrance, which commemorated the lives taken by transgender-based murders. Preceded with a funeral procession, the event took place at the Purdue Mall, where a memorial service and display recognized the more than 245 transgender individuals murdered within recent years. National Postdoctoral Association



Stimulating STEM—an Editorial by Barbara Belmont, NOGLSTP Treasurer

I am usually way too busy to consider contacting my political representatives, but the other day I was seized with a moment of citizen concern and actually took the time to write my senators and congressman. This had to do with news I had just read that the rebuttal stimulus package removed or cut proposed extra funding for NSF, NASA, NOAA, NIST, and DOE. This shocked and upset me because it undermined this country's very necessary investment in technology and science infrastructure -- not only in a financial way, but also in way that signaled that science and technology are not very important to the country.

In the original Senate stimulus package, a substantial amount of funding was earmarked for NSF, NOAA, DOE, NIST and NASA. The rebuttal package involved cuts of 100%, 35%, 38%, 38%, and 50%, respectively, totaling approximately 50% cuts to these agencies. Thanks to the grass roots efforts of Sci/Tech Citizens like myself who contacted their people on the Hill, the compromise package reinstated some of the funding, to a total of only 10% cuts. We all know that discovery and the resulting technology drive our economy. Funded scientists and engineers are the people who make the discoveries and create the technology. Such funding helps train and sustain Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) profes-

sionals, of which there is a shortage among US citizens. The science and technology sector has to import many of its professionals.

Why aren't there enough US citizen STEM professionals? Mainly, I'd say, because US culture doesn't VALUE them and the hard work and extended time it takes to get to the point of productivity. I believe that cutting funding for agencies that use or support STEM workers perpetuates the Bush-era trivialization of science and technology. Our country's future depends on arobust funding and appreciation of all that science and technology can do. What will become of our future society when no one knows how to fix or invent anything?

So I wrote some letters, and I encourage you to do so, too. If you care about science and technology funding, I hope you will email your senators and congresspeople to ask them to continue to support robust funding for science and technology, and thank them for what support they have given. This is important — not only because of our interest in our jobs, but also because of the impact of science and technology on our country's future.
